DLCC Unveils Ambitious "Multi-Cycle" Strategy for Long-Term Democratic Dominance

The Democratic Legislative Campaign Committee (DLCC) on Monday, Feb. 26, revealed an expansive strategy memo, charting a multifaceted plan to venture into historically Republican strongholds and solidify Democratic power over the next decade. Departing from the typical focus on immediate elections, Democrats are now adopting a forward-thinking approach to counter the historical trend of losing gains in subsequent cycles.

Distinguishing itself as the sole party committee investing in multi-cycle victories, the DLCC said it aims to tackle this challenge head-on. Officials said the strategy is to secure immediate electoral triumphs and establish a lasting infrastructure that will fortify Democratic influence for years to come. Investments made in 2024 will lay the foundation to claim the majority in state legislatures throughout the decade, officials declared.

The DLCC stressed the urgency of countering the Republicans' successful long-term game, citing underhanded tactics, gerryman-

dering, and substantial financial investments that have consistently allowed them to dominate state legislatures. To thwart these efforts, the DLCC advocates for significant resources, investments, and a clear strategy for sustained power.

The DLCC also asserted its capability to secure immediate electoral gains while strategically building Democratic power over multiple election cycles. Officials pointed to recent elections reflecting this approach's success, with state Democrats now controlling 41 of the 99 state legislative chambers, marking a significant shift in political power.

As the DLCC gears up for the 2024 cycle with its largest-ever \$60 million budget, officials outlined a bold, evidence-based plan to achieve majority control in 50 chambers by 2030. The multifaceted strategy includes:

- Breaking Republican supermajorities.
- Expanding into traditionally Republican territory.
- Setting the stage for new Democratic trifectas.
- Combating gerrymandering.
- Tracking other races that influence power balances.



• Taking advantage of special elections.

Specifically, the DLCC's multi-cycle strategy targets states like Kansas, North Carolina, and Wisconsin to break or prevent Republican supermajorities. The committee has already invested in Wisconsin and North Carolina as part of its battleground initiatives. Additionally, the DLCC aims to gradually chip away at Republican trifectas in states like Georgia, which is identified as a prime location for political change in 2024.

The DLCC stressed the importance of holding key seats in states that don't align gubernatorial and legislative elections in the same year. This strategic move allows Demo-

crats to establish governing trifectas over multiple cycles. With half of its Senate seats up for election in 2024, Pennsylvania serves as a crucial target for the DLCC, aiming to secure a trifecta in 2026 alongside a competitive gubernatorial race.

Moreover, the DLCC underscored its commitment to combating Republican gerrymandering by supporting efforts for representative maps that accurately reflect the diversity of districts and states. The committee also expanded its focus to include races that impact the balance of power in state legislatures, such as state supreme court seats, lieutenant governorships, and ballot initiatives.

The DLCC highlighted the sig-

nificance of its multi-cycle strategy, emphasizing that it goes beyond single election cycles. Special elections, offering critical opportunities to expand Democratic power incrementally, were highlighted as a key aspect of the strategy.

"With new redistricting maps decided by 2030 elections and in order to fundamentally transform the balance of power in states, we need a long-term strategy to break into territory that Republicans have long dominated," DLCC President Heather Williams said in an email. "That's exactly what this plan does. The DLCC is the only party committee tasked with working cycle over cycle to build Democratic power in state legislatures. Our 2024 target map includes states like Kansas, North Carolina, Georgia, and Wisconsin - states where we must build infrastructure and position Democrats to gradually chip away at Republican power. 2024 is the year of the states, and what happens this year will shape the arc of Democratic power in the states for the decade. Today, Republicans have been put on notice that the DLCC has the plan to win not only the vear, but also the decade and decades to come."

Under the Biden-Harris Save Plan \$138 Billion Loan Debt Canceled



The Biden-Harris administration on February 21, 2024, announced the cancellation of more than \$1 billion in student loans debt for over 150,000 additional borrowers across the country. This move brings the debt relief total to \$138 billion for nearly 4 million Americans

Delivering on his promises, the president on day one has taken action on the student loan crisis. The Supreme Court has done everything to stop and prevent student borrowers from receiving loan forgiveness, but Biden refused to take no for an answer.

There is a crisis in America and many residents were not able to buy a home or take a vacation. President Biden and Vice President Harris are focused on working to alleviate the crushing burden of student loans to rob Peter to pay Paul. As the interest rates continue to grow, you take one step forward and two backward. With the new SAVE plan from Biden's administration lives are being changed, and some Americans are able to breathe again.

The Biden-Harris Administration believes that education beyond high school will unlock doors to opportunity. Biden and Harris have been working to fix the broken student loan system, and make college more affordable. On August 22, 2023, the administration announced the official launch of, "The Saving on a Valuable Education (SAVE) plan."

This is the most affordable repayment plan ever created for college/university students. The SAVE plan is an income-driven repayment (IDR) plan that calculates payments based on a borrower' income and family size. The SAVE plan will cut many borrowers' monthly payments to zero and will save other borrowers around \$1,000 per year. It will also prevent balances from growing because of unpaid interest and will get more borrowers closer to forgiveness faster.

The Administration estimates that over 20 million borrowers could benefit from the SAVE plan. "Today I'm proud to announce a new program called the SAVE plan. It's the most affordable student loan plan ever. Borrowers can sign up by visiting StudentAid.gov/Save," says President Biden.

The SAVE plan will cut payments on undergraduate loans in

half. Borrowers with undergraduate loans will have their payments reduced from 10% to 5% of their discretionary income. Those who have undergraduate and graduate loans will pay a weighted average between 5% and 10% of their incomebased upon the original principal balances of their loan.

This is very complicated and many Americans and especially Black people don't know the SAVE program exist. The Biden-Harris administration has done a poor job, getting the information to the masses of undergraduate, graduate students.

Many Americans don't know that the Biden team across the country has brought the debt relief to a total of \$138 billion for nearly 4 million students. This should be a major news story for the news media, and the SAVE plan and cancel student debt should be one of Biden's major accomplishments. Millions of Americans are free from student loan debt, because of President Piden

Many of these people took out loans less than \$12,000 and have been paying them back for more than a decade. No one making less than about \$15.00 per hour should be required to make a student loan payment, and if you find yourself struggling to make a payment, communicate with your loan ser-

What Dallas' \$1.25 billion bond program covers

Early voting starts April 22 for the May 4 election. The city hasn't yet released a final list of projects planned to be paid for with the bond money.

Almost a month before Dallas voters can begin casting early ballots for or against a \$1.25 billion bond program, they still don't have a final list of projects the bond money could cover.

Dallas city officials had said they planned to make the full project list available by the end of February. But it remains unknown when the itemized list of streets, parks, housing projects and other infrastructure upgrades will be made public. Early voting is April 22-30, and election day is May 4.

Jennifer Nicewander, director of the city's bond and construction management office, and Robert Perez, an assistant city manager who oversees the bond office and other city infrastructure and transportation-related departments, didn't respond to requests for comment Monday about when the list would be public. Perez told the City Council in February that the goal was to have the list finalized by the end of that month.

City officials had planned to host town hall meetings to educate voters about the bond plans ahead of the election, but they have scrapped those plans.

In a March 8 memo to the City Council, Perez said the city-sanctioned meetings were being canceled after hearing from the city attorney's office. The office did not order that the meetings to be canceled, but said state law prohibits public money from being used for political advertising or

for communications that could likely influence a voter's decision

"Any informational townhall meetings would be restricted to the ballot language, proposition description, proposition amount and the payback amount for that proposition with no reference to individual projects," Perez's memo said. "As a result of the project listing discussion restriction, the informational town halls for the 2024 bond program have been cancelled."

City Attorney Tammy Palomino explained in a Feb. 14 memo to the City Council and other officials that state law bans public resources from being used to advocate for the passage or failure of a ballot measure. She said the law was not intended to prevent city councils from discussing whether to place a bond measure on the ballot, but does not make clear what other types of uses are allowed beyond that.

"And, because the election code is silent as to when use of public resources to advocate on behalf of a measure, or a potential measure, are impermissible, our office cautions against any use of public resources at any time to advocate on behalf of or in opposition to an item that could become a measure on an upcoming ballot," Palomino's memo said.

The brunt of educating voters about the \$1.25 billion bond program could fall to a privately-funded campaign launched in support of the propositions. A political action committee called 2024 Dallas Bond Campaign has

registered with the Texas Ethics Commission but has not yet reported details about its funding or donors.

Attorney Tim Powers, a former chair of the city's ethics advisory commission who now cochairs the bond campaign, said the group is planning a public outreach effort that will include mailers, social media posts, yard signage and a website. He said he believes the group will have a "broad coalition of supporters," will aim to raise about \$1 million for the campaign and has raised about half that amount.

"We have a very narrow window of time, but we think we have an appropriate window of time to get the message out that we need to get out," Powers said. "We're not aware that there's any organized opposition. But we hope we're clear enough with what we're able to communicate to convince everybody to support this for the long-term best interest of Dallas."

Dallas voters will be asked to approve 10 propositions in the election that would allow the city to borrow a total of \$1.25 billion for improvements to roads, parks and libraries, as well as other projects focused on housing infrastructure, homelessness, public safety and cultural arts facilities, flood protection and storm draining, economic development and city information technology.

The biggest chunk of bond money, more than \$521 million, will go to street- and transportation-related projects, followed by almost \$346 million for park and recreation projects and \$90 million for police and fire facilities.

Powers said he believed the full project list will be available by next week. He said the campaign is working with several civic organizations and has the endorsements of Mayor Eric Johnson and four past mayors: Mike Rawlings, Tom Leppert, Laura Miller and Ron Kirk.

"I think if we do a real concentrated effort in the three to three and a half weeks before people start voting, we should be able to get a reasonably good turnout," Powers said. "Of course, we do have that concern that it will be a low turnout. We don't have a concern that each of the ten propositions will pass."

Arun Agarwal, who chaired the community bond task force, as well as the park and recreation board, said he doesn't think the public is missing out without the city-run informational bond sessions. His said the bond task force did community outreach last year about the bond program.

"It would be redundant and only bring people who are not agreeing, and there'll always be some people who don't agree," he said.

The May 4 election will be the fourth time that Dallas voters have weighed in on a city bond election over the last two decades. Voters have approved the last three capital bond programs — \$1.35 billion in 2006, \$642 million in 2012 and \$1.05 billion in 2017

An Opportunity to Stop the Hate: Lent and Ramadan



We, the citizens of the United States of America, as well as our fellow citizens of the world, are living in a period of unprecedented conflict. While the word "hatred" is rarely used or mentioned, it is the source of the worst among us toward others. In this country, founded upon the melting pot idea that there is room for everyone, we find people continuing to be attacked based on their race, color, religion, nationality and appearance. It is timely that two of the world's greatest religions would intersect this month with a shared idea that for ages has been the solution to hate and its destruction.

The Christian observance of Lent and the Muslim observance of Ramadan are intersecting with a shared religious practice known as "fasting". The Christian observance calls for giving up certain foods or practices for a 40 day period as a symbolic sharing with Christ in his suffering. Lent is calculated based on the spring equinox.

Ramadan falls on the ninth month of the Islamic calendar, which follows a lunar cycle. As a result, the dates for Ramadan change every year, and the period of fasting is for one month. Muslims fast from dawn until sunset for the entire month. The fast is broken each evening with a meal called "iftar". Fasting is one of the five Pillars of Islam, which are the foundations of Muslim life. Christian fasting in contrast, as established by the Catholic Church, leads up to Easter which celebrates the Crucifixion and Resurrection of Christ.

The importance of this discussion rests with the fact that the concept of fasting in both religions is to bring one closer to God. For the Christian. prayer and self denial during this period seeks to draw one closer to God by reflecting on one's life and conduct in regards to others. Muslims believe that Ramadan is a time of heightened spirituality during which they can purify their souls and seek forgiveness for their sins.

It sounds like this is a good time for all of America to engage in some prayer and fasting for a nation at odds with itself and for a people engaged in hatred and violence against others. What greater way to stop the hate than through prayer and fasting, regardless as to whether one is Christian or Muslim or any other faith. 
This African proverb sums it up: If you want to go fast, go alone. If you want to go far, go together.

Each side sees a lot to fight against. Each side sees a lot to fight for. This election is likely to go to the side that working-class America believes is fighting for them.


In order to understand working-class America today, we have to understand a huge swath of working-class America generally has the same address. It is the place where the factory shut down and opiate addiction, meth addiction and suicides shot up.

The economic and social struggles of this broad base of American society define the political moment that we are in. It is a populist one. This has allowed Donald Trump to speak to Americans' anxieties with no intention of following through, and in completely dishonest ways.

Trump has been stealing Bernie Sanders' talking points since back in 2016. Remember before the all the "rigged election" rhetoric, Trump spoke of the "rigged economy." He truthfully told voters our healthcare system is broken but dishonestly said he would give us a better

one. And, of course he lambasted NAFTA as the disaster it was. It was all empty rhetoric. Trump lacked the conviction, knowledge and genuine desire to do anything about these issues.

Take the issue of trade. All of Trump's tough "America first" talk about trade belies the fact that his policies would do nothing to ensure American competitiveness. Despite China being a favorite target from the

stump, Trump would allow China to dominate the emerging global economy by preventing the domestic growth of the industries at its center.

The irony is that what working-class America is demanding, Joe Biden is delivering. He is just not talking about it.

Biden's landmark Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) is reopening American factories, rebuilding American manufacturing, and creating jobs. Our current president is backing up industrial unions like the United Auto Workers when they find themselves in a real fight. And he is ensuring that America seizes the moment to lead the world economy in this century like we did the last one.

In a world where Donal Trump talks the talk and Joe Biden walks the walk, we should assume that the talker has the advantage. The only way to bridge that gap is for President Biden to start talking the talk, too. As a guy from Scranton, he knows how to do it and it is authentically in his heart.

President Biden does not need to sound more like Trump. Trump is all bluster and aims only to foment anger. What President Biden needs to do is make it clear that when it comes to cars and energy, there is only one future: electric vehicles and renewable sources like solar and wind.

He needs to speak plainly about how if America does not seize these markets and support the manufacturing sectors behind these industries, China will. China already controls more than 80 percent of the world's solar manufacturing capacity and the Chinese electric car industry is growing rapidly.

To be sure, there are many, many factors at play in this year's election. But many of the big ones tie back to the working class. For instance, the gender gap has grown — but not necessarily in Biden's favor. Women skew more heavily towards Biden in polls that follow public displays of Trump's misogyny or news of his sexual assaults. But in general, recent polls are showing Biden's base advantage with women has shrunk. Meanwhile, the gender gap for men skews more and more heavily towards Trump. That is driven by the trend among working-class men. And it is working-class men of all races — including growing numbers of Black men.

Democratic politicians need to get over their default inclination to disregard working-class white men in their messaging. It ultimately leads to disregarding working-class people across the board.

We all grew up hearing that actions speak louder words. But talking the talk is becoming more and more important in our politics. This is not a case against action. Rather, where President Biden is already showing great leadership with his actions, he needs to also make sure the American people hear about it.

Six years after Dallas approved monument to racial violence victims, it's finally happened

Next to downtown's Grassy Knoll, new public artwork provides another vital history lesson about our city's ugly past.

Adjacent to the Sixth Floor Museum and the Grassy Knoll sits another patch of sacred ground with its own historically consequential story.

It took Dallas decades to fully face President John F. Kennedy's assassination. It's taken far longer to acknowledge the murders that occurred about 100 years earlier — just on the other side of where the Triple Underpass would eventually stand.

In 1860, three enslaved Black men — Patrick Jenkins, Cato Miller and the Rev. Samuel Smith — were lynched at this site, alongside the original path of the Trinity River. They were hanged after specious accusations concerning their part in setting a downtown fire, and their deaths became part of an infamous reign of terror led by white businessmen during which enslaved individuals were rounded up and tortured.

At long last, Dallas will formally dedicate a sculpture on the site next Tuesday that honors these three men and all other local victims of lynching and racial violence between 1853 and 1920.

"Shadow Lines," the sundial-inspired weathering steel sculpture, is the work of artists Shane Allbritton and Norman Lee. At one end of its semicircular wall is a poem written by former Dallas resident and poet laureate of Virginia Tim Seibles about this spot and its brutal history.

In early 2018, in the midst of the debate over removal of Confederate statues, City Council members expressed interest in a memorial to victims of racial violence. George Keaton Jr., founder of Remembering Black Dallas, persevered until his death in December 2022 to turn the idea into action. The Dallas County Justice Initiative, with Ed Gray at the helm, and Remembering Black Dallas finished the job.

The sculpture sits in a pocket of city land known as Martyrs

Park. It's not an ideal place for a contemplative green space, trapped between the Triple Underpass and the access ramp to Interstate 35E and deafened by highway traffic and the Trinity Railway Express rumbling overhead

It's no mystery why the dedication ceremony is taking place at the Sixth Floor Museum before the ribbon-cutting at the sculpture site. Hearing the speeches would be impossible at Martyrs Park.

But Gray, like Keaton before him, is steadfast about this being the right location.

"To the people who ask, 'Why did we build this here?' This is where it occurred," Gray told me. "We can't change what's there now, but it remains historic and sacred."

I took my first close look at the sculpture Saturday and was pleasantly surprised to find a more welcoming feel at Martyrs Park, a raw space full of trash and tents on my several previous visits.

Accessibility remains a challenge. Your best bet is to park in the Sixth Floor Museum area and walk along the Elm Street sidewalk and through the pedestrian tunnel. Once you emerge, you are only steps from the park.

The most important upgrades have taken place in the tunnel. Never before had I walked through this long dark corridor when it didn't smell like a urinal — and looked even worse. It's now been repaired, painted,

scrubbed and lighted. On order is vandal-resistant permanent lighting.

The park department has cleaned out decades of trash, underbrush and scraggly bushes that once encircled much of Martyrs Park. The lower limbs of the stately trees along the street and in the background have been trimmed to allow for better viewing. A new sidewalk is in place, and lights illuminate the sculpture at night.

Let me be clear — the place didn't look great. Recent heavy rains had left deep puddles throughout the park and threatened to wash away newly planted grass. The railroad-owned embankment remained unsightly. A man lay tucked up against the sculpture's front wall — his sleep only disturbed when I began reading the inscriptions aloud.

But if you squint a little, you actually see a park, not a dumping ground. It's a minimalist landscape that keeps the focus on the piece of stark public art, just as Keaton wanted.

Still to be added are two Texas Historical Commission markers, one honoring Jenkins, Miller and Smith and the other commemorating Jane Elkins, an enslaved woman hanged in 1853 after her conviction for killing her white owner as he attempted to rape her. Elkins' name is also inscribed on "Shadow Lines."

With the dedication of the sculpture, Gray said, Martyrs Park provides a homecoming

for all local victims of racial violence. "It gives them a sense of all being put together in one spot and further sanctifying that ground."

The "Shadow Lines" dedication will mark the last of three high-profile events in Dallas' reckoning with the violence wrought by racism.

To secure the markers for two other victims, the Dallas County Justice Initiative worked for years to meet the requirements of the Equal Justice Initiative, whose National Memorial for Peace and Justice in Montgomery, Ala., is a shrine to the victims of lynching.

The marker for Allen Brooks, who was abducted, killed and hanged downtown in front of a large crowd in 1910, was dedicated at Pegasus Plaza in November 2021. The marker for William Allen Taylor, lynched by vigilantes in 1884 near the Trinity River, was dedicated last November at Trinity Overlook Park. The names of Brooks and Taylor are also among those on the Martyrs Park sculpture.

Gray had many kind words about how hard City Hall, especially the Equity and Inclusion, Arts and Culture, and Park and Recreation departments, has worked to get the commemorations done right.

He said it was important, in contrast, to note Mayor Eric Johnson has not attended any of the events. "His reluctance to be a part of these is troublesome and disturbing," Gray said.

Johnson's chief of staff, Al-

heli Garza, told me the mayor "regrettably has a preexisting immovable conflict" with Tuesday's event. She said his office is "coordinating a private visit for Mayor Johnson to view the installation and meet the artists on a future date."

Most meaningful to me at the memorial site is Seibles' poem, the words of which are punched into the sculpture's steel wall. It's exactly what needed to be written for Dallas, where we've made a lot of progress but still prefer the reconciliation part of racial healing to the hard truth-telling.

Seibles' words are no Kumbaya moment, but rather searing honesty. Please take time to read the full text, which accompanies my column.

Finally, thinking about the 50 or so tourists I passed on the Grassy Knoll Saturday as I walked to Martyrs Park — where I was the sole visitor, not counting the homeless guy — here's a suggestion: The last JFK information placard is only steps from the pedestrian tunnel. Can a sign be added about the historically relevant events visitors can find on the other side of the bridge?



On the front page, the following statement appeared:

"We wish to plead our own cause. Too long have others spoken for us."

Which brings me to my truth.

There are some serious truths about the so-called mainstream

If you hear people complaining about inequities or racist coverage in 2024, imagine how it was 197 years ago.

The Black Press had a noble beginning and there were valiant men and women who sacrificed everything to provide Black people with a voice.

I can't help but believe that if they were here today; they would be disappointed that percentage-wise fewer Black people are supportive of the institution they lived, fought and died for.

So as I gathered with other publishers from across the country my heart was full with pride. These soldiers without swords were carrying the torch. They were speaking up and speaking out.

What can I say? I tried to imagine the challenges over the decades, as we march toward 200 years of the Black Press.

The love I feel for the Black Press is so strong, because I so deeply believe in what I am doing; telling the stories of our people from the rooter to the tooter (essentially the beginning to the ending). There was a time when the Black Press covered Black people from the time they were born until they died.

That meant you got to hear about the birth, going to school, events they participated in, graduations, church programs, society programs and organizations, employment, and more.

Someone went off to college, and they graduated, and some were drafted into the military. We read about all of that.

There were the engagements, marriages, baby showers, and anniversaries.

We read about those returning home from the military; and sadly we learned of the death of those who didn't come home.

Still further, the Black Press informed about promotions, and job retirements.

It was especially nice to read about those wonderful family reunions. And then, we also learned through our Black Press, about the deaths.

It was so different from what we read about in other publica-

That's probably why more than 150 years after the birth of the Black Press, the Dallas-Fort

Worth Association of Black Communicators, under the leadership of the group that was affectionately called the "Dallas Mafia," began holding community forums — "How to get in the news without committing murder!"

It seemed the only way Blacks were covered in the mainstream, for the most part, was if they committed a crime

So every year we come together and we celebrate the founding of the Black Press, and we celebrate the courageous men and women who made sure that today we could look back, and read about the rich history of Black people in America in our Black newspapers.

Now back to Kitchen+Kocktails.

When NNPA was not taking care of business, we had to eat. Folks suggested places. I remembered that while they originated in Dallas, TX, they had a restaurant in Washington DC, so I suggested it to fellow publishers.

I knew it was a stretch, because this place is very popular, and for good reason.

Art Imitates Life

Hollywood is known for creating fantasies and false narratives, but the entertainment industry does keep it real sometimes, particularly in its efforts to help eliminate the stigma of mental illness. Mental health awareness for African Americans has found its way into popular TV programs with creators and showrunners including storylines that see main characters seeking therapy or having characters be mental health providers. Other shows feature therapy in other ways.

Filmmaker and show creator Lena Waithe deserves kudos for normalizing therapy by incorporating it into series like "Twenties" and "The Chi." In a

sha's mother and her wife also see a therapist throughout the series' six seasons. The main male characters also participate in a circle discussion, meant to help them support each other.

On "Queen Sugar," the lov-

"Twenties" episode titled "Happy Place," the main character, a queer Black woman named Hattie, played by Jonica "Jojo" T. Gibbs, seeks therapy to understand her father's absence and its impact on her relationships with men. On "The Chi" after one of the show's main characters, Kiesha Williams, portrayed by actress Birgundi Baker, is abducted and becomes pregnant from the sexual assault, she is seen in multiple episodes visiting a psychologist.

She also encourages her family to work on their issues. Kie-

ingly protective Hollingsworth "Hollywood" Desonier, played by Omar Dorsey, creates and funds a space for men to gather and uplift each other called The Real Spot, after being injured on an oil rig and successfully suing his employer.

Directed by Debbie Allen for most of its six seasons, "A Different World" took on a number of serious issues including apartheid and divestment, domestic violence, date rape, and

National Links Trust Celebrates Black Golfers Screening

To celebrate Black History Month, The National Links Trust (NLT), a non-profit organization created to protect and promote municipal golf courses, showed the documentary "Uneven Fairways" on Feb. 20. The screening took place at the Rayburn House Office Building on Capitol Hill.

"The legends of Black golf have forged for inclusion at the highest levels of golf competition for all people," said Damian Cosby, executive director of NLT.

Released in 2009, Uneven Fairways is narrated by actor Samuel L. Jackson, an avid golfer whose activism and work in Black communities stretches back to being a student at Morehouse College in the 1960s.

The film highlights the pantheon of Blacks-from Pete Brown, the first Black golfer to win a PGA Tour event at the 1965 Waco Open, to Jim Thorpe, a 75-year-old golfer and Morgan State University graduate with 21 professional wins-who reflect the vanguard of Black golfers who were barred from the professional ranks but persisted in the sport until the PGA's racial barriers ceased in 1961.

Peggy White, the daughter of Ted Rhodes appeared in the documentary, too; Rhodes was widely considered to be the greatest Black golf player before Tiger Woods' emergence.

Rhodes did not get a chance to compete on the PGA Tour.

"I don't think my father was aware of the trailblazer he was," White said. "He had a dream that he would be the finest golfer in the world, but I don't think he realized he accomplished that goal."

Throughout the film, golfers detail how the PGA's color barrier was upheld by a longstanding clause in the PGA. From 1929 to 1961, Article III Section I of the PGA's handbook stated that, "Male professional golfers of the Caucasian race, over the age of eighteen (18) years, residing in North or South Amer-

ica, who can qualify under the terms and condition hereinafter specified, shall be eligible for membership."

While the documentary tells the story of the individual experience of being Black in golf, Uneven Fairways also highlights the founding of the United Golf Association, commonly known as the Chitlin Circuit, which provided Black golfers opportunities to compete.

"Black people, being very resourceful, wanted to play, and so in 1925, a group of Black

businessmen met in a YMCA in Washington, D.C. and basically said 'Well, PGA won't let us play on their tour, so we'll start our own tour," said Pete McDaniel, author of Uneven Lines: The Heroic Story of African-Americans in Golf.

Later that year, the first National Negro Open was contested

The Chitlin Circuit served as an incubator for many of golf's first popular Black players and served as fertile ground for future golf giants.

Speaking to the documentary's name, golfers talked about the conditions of golf courses that UGA players conducted golf tournaments on, citing shoddy landscapes and uneven grounds, usually played on municipal golf courses.

"One of the reasons why I love municipal golf is that it brings people together," Cosby said. "It's the easy way to get a young Black kid who's probably never seen as much green grass on a golf course to keep them out there. That's what I love about it; it connects people to the game and brings people to the game."

Inclusivity was no question for the UGA. Black women were automatically members of the association. Renee Powell, the second Black woman to participate in the LPGA tour, who spoke about her admission into UGA as a teenage golfer, was mentioned in the documentary.

"All the young Black golfers, that's where they played," Albert Green, a UGA/PGA player, explained. "Lee Alder, Charlie Sifford, Calvin Peete, Teddy Rhodes, that's where those guys got their start."

Ron Terry called the Chitlin Circuit a family affair, "It was a tour where you got to know everybody," he said. "It was more like a fraternity than anything."

Many mentioned how players supported one another in efforts on and off the course.

"We all traveled together anyway, so we helped each other... if you were hungry, we're going to feed you, we weren't going to let go around hungry," Leonard James explained.

Members often paid for and provided their own resources, which they were happy to share with others.

"They were going to eat because I always carried electric pots with me and a frying pan," James Black joked back,

Although an alternative league was created, it was still very clear that the color line imposed barriers that didn't impact White athletes.

"It was a joy to be around but it was separate, totally separate and not equal," said John Merchant, a former USGA executive committee member.

Though golfers made their own efforts to break the color barrier of the golf world, the documentary shed light on how Joe Louis, the former heavyweight champion broke the






A pilot is a person that drives a transport vehicle such as an airplane. spacecraft or boat. All types of pilots must pass tests and earn a license before they can operate the vehicle. Airline pilots must be at least 23 years old. A commercial airline pilot's license requires 250 hours of flight experience. The pilots are responsible for making sure that the passengers, crew, and the aircraft itself are safe. Professional female pilots make up only 5% of the piloting workforce, with Black women representing less than 1% of the piloting workforce

SISTERS OF THE SKIES!

Sisters of the Skies is an organization of professional black women pilots. There are less than 150 black women pilots in the United States holding a license. This organization, which tracks the numbers of Black female pilots, was created to inspire young girls of color to take an interest in aviation through mentoring them and pairing them up with Black female pilots who have already earned their wings.
